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About this manual

This manual provides service and reference information for ThinkCentre® computers listed on the front cover.

Illustrations in this manual might look different from your product.

Use this manual along with the advanced diagnostic tests to troubleshoot problems.

Important: This manual is intended only for trained service technicians who are familiar with ThinkCentre computers. Use this manual along with the advanced diagnostic tests to troubleshoot problems effectively. Before servicing a ThinkCentre computer, be sure to read and understand Chapter 1 "Important safety information" on page 1.

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Chapter 1. Important safety information

General safety

Follow these rules to ensure general safety:

- Observe good housekeeping in the area of the machines during and after maintenance.
- When lifting any heavy object:
 - 1. Ensure you can stand safely without slipping.
 - 2. Distribute the weight of the object equally between your feet.
 - 3. Use a slow lifting force. Never move suddenly or twist when you attempt to lift.
 - 4. Lift by standing or by pushing up with your leg muscles; this action removes the strain from the muscles in your back.

Attention: Do not attempt to lift any objects that weigh more than 16 kg (35 lb) or objects that you think are too heavy for you.

- Do not perform any action that causes hazards to the customer, or that makes the equipment unsafe.
- Before you start the machine, ensure that other service representatives and the customer's personnel are not in a hazardous position.
- Place removed covers and other parts in a safe place, away from all personnel, while you are servicing the machine.
- Keep your tool case away from walk areas so that other people will not trip over it.
- Do not wear loose clothing that can be trapped in the moving parts of a machine. Ensure that your sleeves are fastened or rolled up above your elbows. If your hair is long, fasten it.
- Insert the ends of your necktie or scarf inside clothing or fasten it with a nonconductive clip, approximately 8 centimeters (3 inches) from the end.
- Do not wear jewelry, chains, metal-frame eyeglasses, or metal fasteners for your clothing.

Remember: Metal objects are good electrical conductors.

- Wear safety glasses when you are: hammering, drilling, soldering, cutting wire, attaching springs, using solvents, or working in any other conditions that might be hazardous to your eyes.
- After service, reinstall all safety shields, guards, labels, and ground wires. Replace any safety device that is worn or defective.
- Reinstall all covers correctly before returning the machine to the customer.

CAUTION:



Keep fingers and other parts of your body away from hazardous, moving parts. If you suffer an injury, seek medical care immediately.

CAUTION:



Avoid contact with hot components inside the computer. During operation, some components become hot enough to burn the skin. Before you open the computer cover, turn off the computer, disconnect power, and wait approximately 10 minutes for the components to cool.

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Electrical safety



CAUTION:

Electrical current from power, telephone, and communication cables can be hazardous. To avoid personal injury or equipment damage, disconnect the attached power cords, telecommunication systems, networks, and modems before you open the computer covers, unless instructed otherwise in the installation and configuration procedures.

Observe the following rules when working on electrical equipment.

Important: Use only approved tools and test equipment. Some hand tools have handles covered with a soft material that does not insulate you when working with live electrical currents. Many customers have, near their equipment, rubber floor mats that contain small conductive fibers to decrease electrostatic discharges. Do not use this type of mat to protect yourself from electrical shock.

- Find the room emergency power-off (EPO) switch, disconnecting switch, or electrical outlet. If an electrical accident occurs, you can then operate the switch or unplug the power cord quickly.
- Do not work alone under hazardous conditions or near equipment that has hazardous voltages.
- Disconnect all power before:
 - Performing a mechanical inspection
 - Working near power supplies
 - Removing or installing Field Replaceable Units (FRUs)
- Before you start to work on the machine, unplug the power cord. If you cannot unplug it, ask the customer to power-off the wall box that supplies power to the machine and to lock the wall box in the off position.
- If you need to work on a machine that has exposed electrical circuits, observe the following precautions:
 - Ensure that another person, familiar with the power-off controls, is near you.
 Remember: Another person must be there to switch off the power, if necessary.
 - Use only one hand when working with powered-on electrical equipment; keep the other hand in your pocket or behind your back.
 - **Remember:** There must be a complete circuit to cause electrical shock. By observing the above rule, you may prevent a current from passing through your body.
 - When using a tester, set the controls correctly and use the approved probe leads and accessories for that tester.
 - Stand on suitable rubber mats (obtained locally, if necessary) to insulate you from grounds such as metal floor strips and machine frames.

Observe the special safety precautions when you work with very high voltages; these instructions are in the safety sections of maintenance information. Use extreme care when measuring high voltages.

- Regularly inspect and maintain your electrical hand tools for safe operational condition.
- Do not use worn or broken tools and testers.
- Never assume that power has been disconnected from a circuit. First, check that it has been powered-off.
- Always look carefully for possible hazards in your work area. Examples of these hazards are moist floors, nongrounded power extension cables, power surges, and missing safety grounds.
- Do not touch live electrical circuits with the reflective surface of a plastic dental mirror. The surface is conductive; such touching can cause personal injury and machine damage.
- Do not service the following parts with the power on when they are removed from their normal operating places in a machine:

- Power supply units
- Pumps
- Blowers and fans
- Motor generators

and similar units. (This practice ensures correct grounding of the units.)

- If an electrical accident occurs:
 - Use caution; do not become a victim yourself.
 - Switch off power.
 - Send another person to get medical aid.

Safety inspection guide

The intent of this inspection guide is to assist you in identifying potentially unsafe conditions on these products. Each machine, as it was designed and built, had required safety items installed to protect users and service personnel from injury. This guide addresses only those items. However, good judgment should be used to identify potential safety hazards due to attachment of features or options not covered by this inspection guide.

If any unsafe conditions are present, you must determine how serious the apparent hazard could be and whether you can continue without first correcting the problem.

Consider these conditions and the safety hazards they present:

- Electrical hazards, especially primary power (primary voltage on the frame can cause serious or fatal electrical shock).
- Explosive hazards, such as a damaged CRT face or bulging capacitor
- Mechanical hazards, such as loose or missing hardware

The guide consists of a series of steps presented in a checklist. Begin the checks with the power off, and the power cord disconnected.

Checklist:

- 1. Check exterior covers for damage (loose, broken, or sharp edges).
- 2. Power-off the computer. Disconnect the power cord.
- 3. Check the power cord for:
 - a. A third-wire ground connector in good condition. Use a meter to measure third-wire ground continuity for 0.1 ohm or less between the external ground pin and frame ground.
 - b. The power cord should be the appropriate type as specified in the parts listings.
 - c. Insulation must not be frayed or worn.
- 4. Remove the cover.
- 5. Check for any obvious alterations. Use good judgment as to the safety of any alterations.
- 6. Check inside the unit for any obvious unsafe conditions, such as metal filings, contamination, water or other liquids, or signs of fire or smoke damage.
- 7. Check for worn, frayed, or pinched cables.
- 8. Check that the power-supply cover fasteners (screws or rivets) have not been removed or tampered with.

Handling electrostatic discharge-sensitive devices

Any computer part containing transistors or integrated circuits (ICs) should be considered sensitive to electrostatic discharge (ESD). ESD damage can occur when there is a difference in charge between objects. Protect against ESD damage by equalizing the charge so that the machine, the part, the work mat, and the person handling the part are all at the same charge.

Notes:

- 1. Use product-specific ESD procedures when they exceed the requirements noted here.
- 2. Make sure that the ESD protective devices you use have been certified (ISO 9000) as fully effective.

When handling ESD-sensitive parts:

- Keep the parts in protective packages until they are inserted into the product.
- Avoid contact with other people while handling the part.
- Wear a grounded wrist strap against your skin to eliminate static on your body.
- Prevent the part from touching your clothing. Most clothing is insulative and retains a charge even when you are wearing a wrist strap.
- Use the black side of a grounded work mat to provide a static-free work surface. The mat is especially useful when handling ESD-sensitive devices.
- Select a grounding system, such as those listed below, to provide protection that meets the specific service requirement.

Note: The use of a grounding system is desirable but not required to protect against ESD damage.

- Attach the ESD ground clip to any frame ground, ground braid, or green-wire ground.
- Use an ESD common ground or reference point when working on a double-insulated or batteryoperated system. You can use coax or connector-outside shells on these systems.
- Use the round ground-prong of the ac plug on ac-operated computers.

Grounding requirements

Electrical grounding of the computer is required for operator safety and correct system function. Proper grounding of the electrical outlet can be verified by a certified electrician.

When replacing the lithium battery, use only Part Number 45C1566 or an equivalent type battery recommended by the manufacturer. If your system has a module containing a lithium battery, replace it only with the same module type made by the same manufacturer. The battery contains lithium and can explode if not properly used, handled, or disposed of. Do not:

- · Throw or immerse into water
- Heat to more than 100°C (212°F)
- Repair or disassemble

Dispose of the battery as required by local ordinances or regulations.

Strategy for replacing FRUs

Before replacing parts:

Ensure that all software fixes, drivers, and UEFI BIOS downloads are installed before you replace any FRUs listed in this manual.

After a system board is replaced, ensure that the latest UEFI BIOS is loaded to the system board before you complete the service action.

To download and install software fixes, drivers, and UEFI BIOS, go to https://pcsupport.lenovo.com and follow the instructions on the screen.

Use the following strategy to prevent unnecessary expense for replacing and servicing FRUs:

- If you are instructed to replace a FRU but the replacement does not correct the problem, reinstall the original FRU before you continue.
- Some computers have both a processor board and a system board. If you are instructed to replace either the processor board or the system board, and replacing one of them does not correct the problem, reinstall that board, and then replace the other one.
- If an adapter or a device consists of more than one FRU, any of the FRUs might be the cause of the error.
 Before replacing the adapter or device, remove the FRUs, one by one, to see if the symptoms change.
 Replace only the FRU that changed the symptoms.

Strategy for replacing a hard disk drive or a solid-state drive

Always try to run a low-level format operation before replacing a hard disk drive or a solid-state drive. This will cause all customer data on the drive to be lost. Ensure that the customer has a current backup of the data before you perform this task.

Attention: The drive startup sequence in the computer you are servicing might have been changed. Be extremely careful during write operations such as copying, saving, or formatting. If you select an incorrect drive, data or programs can be overwritten.

Important notice for replacing a system board

Some components mounted on a system board are very sensitive. Improper handling of a system board can cause damage to those components, and may cause a system malfunction.

After replacing the system board, use the Golden Key U1 tool to bind the model type, serial number, and Brand ID of the computer with the new system board. Refer to <a href="https://support.lenovo.com/us/en/solutions/https://support.lenovo.

This model provides the ability for a customer to configure a Lenovo solution from a Web site, and have this configuration sent to fulfillment, where it is built and shipped directly to the customer. The machine label and eSupport will load these products as the 4-character MT, 4-character model, and 2-character country code. The model is "CTO1" and the default country code is "WW" (example: 20AACTO1WW).

Special-bid model

This model is a unique configuration that has been negotiated between Lenovo and the customer. A unique MTM consists of a 4-character MT, a 4-character model, and a numeric 2-character country code is provided to the customer to place orders (example: 20AA000955). The country code assigned is numeric and does not designate a specific country or region. The custom model factsheet for the MTM indicates which country the special-bid MTM is set up for. Special-bid offering is not generally announced.

Standard model

Standard models (fixed configuration) are announced and offered to all customers. The MTM portion of the machine label consists of a 4-character MT, a 4-character model, and an alphabetic 2-character country code. The country code assigned is alphabetic and represents a designated country or region (example: 20AA0009UK).





Chapter 4. Service checkout and symptom-to-FRU index

This chapter provides information about general service checkout and symptom-to-FRU index.

Service checkout

Attention: The drives in the computer you are servicing might have been rearranged or the drive startup sequence changed. Be extremely careful during write operations such as copying, saving, or formatting. Data or programs can be overwritten if you select an incorrect drive.

General error messages appear if a problem or conflict is found by a program, the operating system, or both. For an explanation of these messages, refer to the information supplied with that software package.

Use the following procedure to help determine the cause of the problem:

- 1. Turn off the computer and all external devices.
- 2. Check all cables and power cords.
- 3. Set all display controls to the middle position.
- 4. Turn on all external devices.
- 5. Turn on the computer.
 - Look for displayed error codes.
 - Listen for beep codes.
 - Look for readable instructions or a main menu on the display.

If you did not receive the correct response, proceed to step 6 on page 33.

If you do receive the correct response, proceed to step 7 on page 33.

- 6. Look at the following conditions and follow the instructions:
 - If you hear beep codes during POST, go to "Beep symptoms" on page 35.
 - If the computer displays a POST error, go to "POST error codes" on page 35.
 - If the computer hangs and no error is displayed, continue at step 7 on page 33.
- 7. Run the Diagnostic programs. See Chapter 5 "Diagnostics" on page 41.
 - If you receive an error, replace the part that the diagnostic program calls out.
 - If the test stops and you cannot continue, replace the last device tested.

Problem determination tips

Due to the variety of hardware and software combinations that can be encountered, use the following information to assist you in problem determination. If possible, have this information available when requesting assistance from Service Support and Engineering functions.

- Machine type and model
- Processor or hard disk drive upgrades
- Failure symptom
 - Do diagnostics indicate a failure?
 - What, when, where, single, or multiple systems?
 - Is the failure repeatable?
 - Has this configuration ever worked?

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- If it has been working, what changes were made prior to its failing?
- Is this the original reported failure?
- · Diagnostics version
 - Type and version level
- Hardware configuration
 - Print (print screen) configuration currently in use
 - BIOS level
- · Operating system software
 - Type and version level

Notes: To eliminate confusion, identical systems are considered identical only if they:

- 1. Are the exact machine type and models
- 2. Have the same BIOS level
- 3. Have the same adapters/attachments in the same locations
- 4. Have the same address jumpers/terminators/cabling
- 5. Have the same software versions and levels
- 6. Have the same Diagnostic Diskettes (version)
- 7. Have the same configuration options set in the system
- 8. Have the same setup for the operating system control files

Comparing the configuration and software set-up between "working and non-working" systems will often lead to problem resolution.

Symptom-to-FRU index

The Symptom-to-FRU index lists error symptoms and possible causes. The most likely cause is listed first. Always begin with "Service checkout" on page 33. This index can also be used to help you decide which FRUs to have available when servicing a computer. If you are unable to correct the problem using this index, go to "Undetermined problems" on page 38.

Notes:

- The Symptom-to-FRU index is not specific to any machine type and are applicable to all ThinkCentre computers.
- · If you have both an error message and an incorrect audio response, diagnose the error message first.
- If you cannot run the diagnostic tests or you get a diagnostic error code when running a test, but did receive a POST error message, diagnose the POST error message first.
- If you did not receive any error message, look for a description of your error symptoms in the first part of this index.

Hard disk drive boot error

A hard disk drive boot error can have the following causes.

Error	FRU/Action
The start-up drive is not in the boot sequence in configuration.	Check the configuration and ensure that the start-up drive is in the boot sequence.
No operating system installed on the boot drive.	Install an operating system on the boot drive.

Error	FRU/Action
The boot sector on the startup drive is corrupted.	The drive must be formatted. Do the following:
	Attempt to back up the data on the failing hard disk drive.
	Using the operating system programs, format the hard disk drive.
The drive is defective.	Replace the hard disk drive.

Beep symptoms

Beep symptoms are tones or a series of tones separated by pauses (intervals without sound) during POST.

The following table describes the beep symptoms.

Beep symptom	FRU/Action
2 short beeps: common POST error	Common POST error code. See the detailed failure information in "POST error codes" on page 35.
3 short and 1 long beeps: DRAM memory error	Perform the following actions in order: 1. Make sure that the memory modules are properly seated in the memory slots. 2. Replace the memory modules. 3. Replace the system board (for trained service personnel only).

POST error codes

Each time you turn on the system, it performs a series of tests that check the operation of the system and some options. This series of tests are called the *Power-On Self-Test*, or *POST*. POST checks the following operations:

- Some basic system-board operations
- Memory operation
- Video operation

• Whether the boot drive is working

If the POST detects a problem, an error message appears on the screen. A single problem might cause several error messages to appear. When you correct the cause of the first error message, the other error messages probably will not appear on the screen the next time.

Undetermined problems

- 1. Turn off the computer.
- 2. Remove or disconnect the following components (if installed) one at a time.
 - a. External devices (modem, printer, or mouse)
 - b. Any adapters
 - c. Memory modules
 - d. Extended video memory
 - e. External Cache
 - f. External Cache RAM
 - g. Hard disk drive
 - h. Diskette drive
- 3. Turn on the computer to retest the system.

4. Repeat steps 1 through 3 until you find the failing device or adapter.

If all devices and adapters have been removed, and the problem continues, replace the system board. See "System board" on page 111.

Chapter 5. Diagnostics

Use diagnostic solutions to test hardware components and report operating-system-controlled settings that interfere with the correct operation of your computer.

Basic procedure for resolving computer problems

Prerequisite

Before you start, read Chapter 1 "Important safety information" on page 1 and print the following instructions.

- 1. Check that:
 - a. The cables for all connected devices are connected correctly and securely.
 - b. All components have been reassembled correctly.
 - All connected devices that require ac power are connected to properly grounded and working electrical outlets.
 - d. All connected devices are enabled in UEFI BIOS.
- 2. Use an antivirus program to see if the computer has been infected by a virus. If the program detects a virus, remove the virus.
- 3. Go to "Self-help resources" on page 42 and follow the instructions for the type of problem you are experiencing.
- 4. Run the diagnostic program.
- 5. Recover your operating system. See "Self-help resources" on page 42.
- 6. If the problem persists, contact Lenovo.

UEFI diagnostic program

A UEFI diagnostic program is preinstalled on the computer. It enables you to test memory modules and internal storage devices, view system information, and check and recover bad sectors on internal storage devices.

To run the UEFI diagnostic program, do the following:

- 1. Turn on the computer. If the computer cannot be turned on, go to "Basic procedure for resolving computer problems" on page 41. If an error code is displayed, go to "" on page for error code descriptions and troubleshooting hints.
- 2. Repeatedly press and release the F10 key when turning on the computer. The main screen of the UEFI diagnostic program is displayed.
- 3. Follow the instructions on the screen to use the diagnostic program.

Chapter 6. Hardware removal and installation

This chapter provides instructions on how to remove and install hardware for your computer.

Handling static-sensitive devices

Do not open the static-protective package containing the new part until the defective part has been removed and you are ready to install the new part. Static electricity, although harmless to you, can seriously damage computer components and options.

When you handle options and other computer components, take these precautions to avoid static-electricity damage:

- Limit your movement. Movement can cause static electricity to build up around you.
- Always handle options and other computer components carefully. Handle PCI/PCIe cards, memory modules, system boards, and microprocessors by the edges. Never touch any exposed circuitry.
- Prevent others from touching the options and other computer components.
- Touch the static-protective package containing the part to a metal expansion-slot cover or other unpainted metal surface on the computer for at least two seconds. This reduces static electricity from the package and your body before you install or replace a new part.
- When possible, remove the new part from the static-protective package, and install it directly in the computer without setting the part down. When this is not possible, place the static-protective package on a smooth, level surface and place the part on the package.
- Do not place the part on the computer cover or other metal surface.


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Major FRUs and CRUs

- **Self-service CRUs:** Refer to parts that can be installed or replaced easily by customer themselves or by trained service technicians at an additional cost.
- Optional-service CRUs: Refer to parts that can be installed or replaced by customers with a greater skill level. Trained service technicians can also provide service to install or replace the parts under the type of warranty designated for the customer's machine.
- **FRUs:** Refer to parts that must be installed or replaced only by trained service technicians. If customers choose to replace the FRUs by themselves, the product warranty might be affected.






Figure 1. M70a system board




Figure 2. M90a system board




Figure 3. Removing the full-function monitor stand




Figure 4. Removing the full-function monitor stand base




Figure 5. Installing the full-function monitor stand base




Figure 6. Installing the full-function monitor stand




Figure 7. Removing the UltraFlex IV Stand




Figure 8. Removing the UltraFlex IV Stand base




Figure 9. Installing the UltraFlex IV Stand base




Figure 10. Installing the UltraFlex IV Stand




Figure 11. Removing the rear cover




Figure 12. Installing the rear cover




Figure 13. Removing the optical drive




Figure 14. Removing the optical drive bracket




Figure 15. Installing the optical drive bracket




Figure 16. Installing the optical drive




Figure 17. Removing the optical drive




Figure 18. Removing the optical drive bracket




Figure 19. Installing the optical drive bracket




Figure 20. Installing the optical drive




Figure 21. Removing the optical drive holder




Figure 22. Installing the optical drive holder




Figure 23. Removing the optical drive holder




Figure 24. Installing the optical drive holder




Figure 25. Removing the system board shield




Figure 26. Installing the system board shield




Figure 27. Installing the system board shield screw




Figure 28. Removing the system board shield




Figure 29. Installing the system board shield




Figure 30. Opening the cable cover




Figure 31. Removing the VESA mount bracket cover




Figure 32. Installing the VESA mount bracket cover




Figure 33. Opening the cable cover




Figure 34. Removing the VESA mount bracket cover




Figure 35. Installing the VESA mount bracket cover




Figure 36. Removing the VESA mount bracket




Figure 37. Installing the VESA mount bracket




Figure 38. Removing the VESA mount bracket




Figure 39. Installing the VESA mount bracket




Figure 40. Removing the storage drive and the bracket




Figure 41. Removing the storage drive from the bracket




Figure 42. Disconnecting the storage drive cable




Figure 43. Connecting the storage drive cable




Figure 44. Installing the storage drive to the bracket




Figure 45. Installing the storage drive and the bracket




Figure 46. Removing the storage drive and the bracket




Figure 47. Removing the storage drive from the bracket




Figure 48. Disconnecting the storage drive cable




Figure 49. Connecting the storage drive cable




Figure 50. Installing the storage drive to the bracket




Figure 51. Installing the storage drive and the bracket




Figure 52. Removing the system fan




Figure 53. Installing the system fan




Figure 54. Removing the system fan




Figure 55. Installing the system fan




Figure 56. Removing the heat sink




Figure 57. Installing the heat sink




Figure 58. Removing the heat sink




Figure 59. Installing the heat sink




Figure 60. Tightening the heat sink screws




Figure 61. Removing the bump cover




Figure 62. Installing the bump cover




Figure 63. Removing the bump cover




Figure 64. Installing the bump cover




Figure 65. Removing the M.2 solid-state drive




Figure 66. Installing the M.2 solid-state drive




Figure 67. Removing the M.2 solid-state drive




Figure 68. Installing the M.2 solid-state drive




Figure 69. Removing the M.2 solid-state drive




Figure 70. Installing the M.2 solid-state drive




Figure 71. Removing the M.2 solid-state drive




Figure 72. Installing the M.2 solid-state drive




Figure 73. Releasing the handle




Figure 74. Opening the retainer




Figure 76. Installing the microprocessor




Figure 77. Closing the retainer




Figure 78. Securing the retainer with the handle




Figure 79. Releasing the handle




Figure 80. Opening the retainer




Figure 81. Removing the microprocessor




Figure 82. Installing the microprocessor




Figure 83. Closing the retainer




Figure 84. Securing the retainer with the handle




Figure 85. Removing the serial connector module




Figure 86. Installing the serial connector module




Figure 87. Removing the serial connector module




Figure 88. Installing the serial connector module




Figure 89. Removing the cable cover




Figure 90. Installing the cable cover




Figure 91. Removing the cable cover




Figure 92. Installing the cable cover




Figure 93. M70a memory module slots




Figure 94. M90a memory module slots




Figure 95. Removing a memory module




Figure 96. Installing a memory module




Figure 97. Removing a memory module




Figure 98. Installing a memory module




Figure 99. Removing the Wi-Fi card shield




Figure 104. Installing the Wi-Fi card shield




Figure 105. Removing the Wi-Fi card shield




Figure 110. Installing the Wi-Fi card shield

If the coin-cell battery is incorrectly replaced, there is danger of an explosion. The coin-cell battery contains a small amount of harmful substance. To avoid possible injury:

- Replace only with a battery of the type recommended by Lenovo.
- · Keep the battery away from fire.
- Do not expose it to excessive heat.
- Do not expose it to water or rain.
- · Do not short-circuit it.
- . Do not drop, crush, puncture the battery, or make it subject to strong forces. Battery abuse or mishandling can cause the battery to overheat, which can cause gasses or flame to "vent" from the battery or coin-cell battery.

Your computer has a special type of memory that maintains the date, time, and settings for built-in features, such as parallel connector assignments (configurations). A coin-cell battery keeps this information active when you turn off the computer.

The coin-cell battery normally requires no charging or maintenance throughout its life; however, no coin-cell battery lasts forever. If the coin-cell battery fails, the date and time information is lost. An error message is displayed when you turn on the computer.




Figure 111. Removing the coin-cell battery




Figure 112. Installing the coin-cell battery




Figure 113. Removing the coin-cell battery




Figure 114. Installing the coin-cell battery




Figure 115. Removing the cover presence switch (intrusion switch)




Figure 116. Installing the cover presence switch (intrusion switch)




Figure 117. Removing the cover presence switch (intrusion switch)




Figure 118. Installing the cover presence switch (intrusion switch)




Figure 119. Removing the e-Privacy button board




Figure 120. Installing the e-Privacy button board




Figure 121. Removing the card reader




Figure 122. Installing the card reader




Figure 123. Removing the card reader




Figure 124. Installing the card reader




Figure 125. Removing the system board




Figure 126. Installing the system board




Figure 127. Installing the system board screws




Figure 128. Removing the system board




Figure 129. Installing the system board




Figure 130. Installing the system board screws




Figure 131. Removing the internal speakers




Figure 132. Installing the internal speakers




Figure 133. Removing the internal speakers




Figure 134. Installing the internal speakers




Figure 135. Removing the left I/O bracket




Figure 136. Installing the left I/O bracket




Figure 137. Removing the right I/O bracket




Figure 138. Removing the right I/O bracket from the main frame




Figure 139. Installing the right I/O bracket to the main frame




Figure 140. Installing the right I/O bracket




Figure 141. Removing the shield of the integrated camera and microphone module




Figure 142. Removing the integrated camera and microphone module




Figure 143. Installing the integrated camera and microphone module




Figure 144. Installing the shield of the integrated camera and microphone module




Figure 145. Removing the shield of the integrated camera and microphone module




Figure 146. Removing the integrated camera and microphone module




Figure 147. Installing the integrated camera and microphone module




Figure 148. Installing the shield of the integrated camera and microphone module




Figure 149. Removing the main frame




Figure 150. Installing the main frame




Figure 151. Removing the main frame




Figure 152. Installing the main frame




Figure 153. Removing the front decoration cover




Figure 154. Installing the front decoration cover




Figure 155. Removing the front decoration cover




Figure 156. Installing the front decoration cover




Figure 157. Releasing the Wi-Fi antennas and cables




Figure 158. Removing the Wi-Fi antennas




Figure 159. Installing the Wi-Fi antennas




Figure 160. Routing the Wi-Fi antennas and cables




Figure 161. Releasing the Wi-Fi antennas and cables




Figure 162. Removing the Wi-Fi antennas




Figure 163. Installing the Wi-Fi antennas




Figure 164. Routing the Wi-Fi antennas and cables




Figure 165. Removing the LCD bracket and LCD panel




Figure 166. Installing the LCD bracket and LCD panel




Figure 167. Removing the LCD bracket and LCD panel




Figure 168. Installing the LCD bracket and LCD panel
